








The First President of Emory College, Oxford, GA.

Born April 11, 1789 in Columbia County, GA and died November 21, 1845.

Son of Major Ignatius Few (Patriot Army, Revolutionary War) and Mary Candler.



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Few was therefore cousin of Asa Griggs Candler...

#### ASA GRIGGS CANDLER




...the founder of the Coca-Cola Company. Asa Griggs Candler famously presented a personal check for \$1,000,000 to found Emory University in Atlanta in 1914.

Perhaps unsurprisingly, his brother, Bishop Warren Akin Candler, was elected first Chancellor of the relocated university.


Few's grave marker, Oxford Cemetery

## TRINITY METHODIST CHURCH Mother Church of Savannah Methodism

Trinity Church is the oldest Methodist Church in a city whose intimate association with John Wesley and George Whitefield gives it a unique place in the history of Methodism. The cornerstone of the building was laid February 14, 1848, in a ceremony presided over by the Reverend Alfred T. Mann. Pastor. The edifice, which was completed in 1850, is in the Corinthian order of architecture and was designed by John B. Hogg of Savannah.


Prior to the erection of Trinity Church the Methodist congregation in Savannah worshipped in Wesley Chapel on South Broad Street. Among the great preachers of the Methodist Church whose are associated with the Chapel are Francis Asbury. William Capers, John Howard, James C. Andrew, Ignatius Few. Elijah Sinclair and George F. Pierce. Through their faith and service others have lived more valiantly.





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THE Masonic ceremony of placing the finishing stone upon a Monument to the memory of the late Rev. IGNATIUS A. FEW, (says the Savannah Republican, of Nov. 7,) was recently performed at Oxford, (Ga.) by the Grand Lodge of this State.

A large procession, of whom 560 were Masons, was formed, and proceeded to the Church, where an eloquent and tou:hing address was delivered by the Rev. Dr. Means, the long-tried friend of the deceased.

The procession moved from the Church to the Monument—which had been previously erected, leaving the cap-stone to be placed in its proper position under the direction of the Grand Master. The Grand Officers occupied a platform fronting the Monument, on the east, while the Brethren of the Fraternity formed in a circle round its base. After prayer by Rev. Br. Carter, the Grand Chaplain, Past Master Y. P. King made a short and appropriate address, in which he spoke of the deceased as an old and venerated friend. The ground upon which his address would have been based, having been so ably traversed by his predecessor he did not deem it necessary to extend his remarks. He assumed the Grand

Lodge to have acquitted itself of a duty worthy of its high calling, in perpetuating, with that elegant Monument, the memory of a distinguished Brother; and, as an act of justice, he begged permission to call attention to the fact that San Marino Lodge, No. 34, at Greensboro', had first suggested the rearing of this pillar. In proof of which he read, from a copy of the minutes of that Lodge, a resolution, calling upon sister Lodges throughout the State, to express their approbation of the suggestion.

The Worshipful Grand Master, Wm. C. Dawson, then proceeded to perform the appropriate Masonic ceremonies, with Corn, Wine and Oil, accompanied with the following invocation:

"May the all bounteous Author of our Nature bless the inhabitants of this place with all the necessaries, conveniences and comforts of life; long preserve this structure from decay; and grant to us all, in needed supply, the Corn of nourishment, the Wine of refreshment, and the Oil of joy."

Several articles were then placed in his hands by individual Brethren, to be deposited in the Monument previous to placing the cap stone in its final position. The ceremonies closed with prayer, by the Rev. Dr. George F. Pierce.

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


William C. Dawson 1798–1856 Georgia Grand Master 1843–1856



### L.Q.C. LAMAR




Lucius Quintus Cincinnatus Lamar (September 17, 1825 – January 23, 1893) from Mississippi. United States Representative and Senator, served as United States Secretary of the Interior in the first administration of President Grover Cleveland, and as Associate Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court.


• Lamar married Virginia Longstreet, the daughter of Augustus Baldwin Longstreet, Few's successor as president of Emory College.






## AUGUSTUS BALDWIN LONGSTREET AND OLE MISS

In 1849, Longstreet was elected president of Ole Miss by its Board of Trustees, dominated by Past Grand Master (1826–1837, 1840, 1845 & 1846) of Mississippi, Governor John A. Quitman, and future Grand Master (1852), James M. Howry. Ole Miss's earliest badge, adopted by the same Board members in 1845, was the all-seeing Eye of Providence.



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


Originally adopted in 1782 as part of the reverse blazon of the Great Seal of the United States and celebrated on the US dollar bill. By the early 1800s, however, the All-Seeing Eye had become a common masonic visual signifier.



## AUGUSTUS BALDWIN LONGSTREET AND OLE MISS


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Longstreet invited his son-in-law L.Q.C. Lamar to join him at Ole Miss in 1852 (which he did as professor of mathematics for 1 year). Lamar later returned (1860) and became chair of governmental science and law (1867) in the Ole Miss School of Law.




## AUGUSTUS BALDWIN LONGSTREET



Augustus Baldwin Longstreet was also a respected Greensboro Courthouse lawyer, later judge. In 1838, Longstreet entered the Methodist ministry. With the Rev. Dr. Alexander Means, Longstreet helped found the Southern Masonic Female College in Covington (1853-81), the larger town bordering the southernmost edge of Oxford.

### REV. BRO. ALEXANDER MEANS

Alexander Means, clergyman, inventor, and poet born Statesville, North Carolina, February 6, 1801, died in Oxford, GA, June 5, 1883. Licensed to preach in the Methodist Church in 1828, Means was the first superintendent of the Manual Labor School (1834-1838), professor of natural science (1838-1846), and president of Emory College (1854-1855); president of the Southern Masonic Female College in Covington, GA (1853). Means was the Confederacy's official inspector of munitions during the Civil War.

Orr was appointed Secretary of Education for Georgia in 1872 and is credited with creating Georgia's public education system.


